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Chicagoland Chapter Principles

1. As a Jewish organization, we base our understanding of Jewishness on grounded and sincere self-identification.
2. We strive to become an integral, yet autonomous, Jewish part of the broader struggles for labor rights, housing justice, environmentalism, feminism, LGBTQ+ equality, and the rights of ethnic, religious, and racial minorities — all united by a commitment to collective liberation.
3. We wish to popularize and increase access to Jewish culture in all its diversity, including Jewish diaspora languages.
4. We believe in Doikayt (Hereness). Jews in Chicago and around the world can engage in forms of self determination that are not inferior to Jewish statehood. The Bund strives to enable such self-determination by building local communal bodies, based on voluntary participation, and elected leadership open to Jews across the whole denominational spectrum.
5. We refuse to believe that antisemitism is a timeless problem that Jews are eternally doomed to wherever we live. However, it can only be systematically solved through consistent united solidarity against all forms of prejudice.
6. We adopt an anti-Zionist approach to Israel-Palestine, prioritizing ending the occupation, oppression, segregation, and discrimination that has been ongoing since the foundation of the State of Israel. Given that great injustices and crimes are being done to the Palestinian people in the name of our safety, we feel called to include this in our organizing efforts in addition to our work focused on other parts of the world.
7. Recognizing the acceptance of all these principles as necessary to become a member of the Chicagoland Bund, we aim to reach out to the wider Jewish community in order to gain further support, as well as strive for constructive cooperation with other organizations on issues where doing so would be beneficial to our values as a whole.



Chicagoland Charter

Article I

Section 1: To count as a *full member* of the Chicagoland Chapter of the IJLB, then one must meet the following criteria:

Have agreed to the Points of Unity listed on the official IJLB Provisional Membership form or that form's official successors;
Have agreed to the Code of Conduct listed on the official IJLB Provisional Membership form or that form's official successors;
Have undergone an onboarding meeting with an approved member of the Chicagoland Bund; and
Have joined the Chicagoland Chapter's official members-only Signal or other, official communication channel limited to the membership.

Section 2: To count as an *active member* of the Chicagoland Bund, then one must meet the following criteria:

Meet all the Section 1 criteria; and
Have participated in a meeting or an event of the Chicagoland Bund in the past 6-months (following an initial buffer period of 6-months upon completing Section 1 and joining the chapter).

Section 3: All references to *the membership* in this charter refer to all full members of the Chicagoland Bund, not just active members.

Article II

Section 1: The default method for making any decision or taking any action *as a chapter* is to poll the *active membership*. Here, a simple majority vote among voting members is sufficient for approval. If polling the membership electronically, votes should be available for at least 72 hours. Additionally, Shabbos and other holidays where observing members cannot use their phones are excluded from counting towards the 72-hour window.

Section 2: The membership, through the method outlined in Section 1, can delegate decision-making and/or action-taking power to any specified subset of the active membership.

Section 3: The membership can revoke powers granted under Section 2 through the method outlined in Section 1.

Section 4: The membership can adopt stricter voting standards, such as requiring a super majority or unanimity among voting members, for granting or revoking powers only with a vote that itself meets the heightened requirements.

Section 5: The active membership can adopt quorum requirements, such as requiring that half of the active membership participates in a vote, for granting or revoking powers. However, that vote of the active membership must itself meet the proposed quorum.

Section 6: Decisions delegating power must be in writing and made accessible to the entire membership.

Article III

Section 1: The roles described in Article III are exempt from the requirements listed in Article II and are instead governed by Article III.

Section 2: The following roles must be filled by *active members*: 3 International Delegates, and 3 Chapter Conveners. The members elected to fill these roles constitute the organization's Organizing Committee.

Section 3: Each member of the Organizing Committee serves for contemporaneous, 3-month terms. In the event that any of the members of the Organizing Committee are unable to finish their term, then a new election must be held to fill the position for the remainder of the term.

Section 4: To be elected to the Organizing Committee, a candidate must win a plurality of the votes cast for the position the candidate ran for on the Organizing Committee.

Section 5: The responsibilities of each of the members of the Organizing Committee are as follows:

1st Delegate:

- Initial IJLB Voting Delegate when under 20 active members

2nd Delegate:

- 2nd Voting Delegate when between 20 - 30 active members

3rd Delegate:

- 3rd Voting Delegate when over 30 active members

Alternate Delegate

- Substitute Voting Delegate when any active Voting Delegate is absent and cannot attend an IJLB Delegate Body Meeting

Conveners

- Responsible for ensuring the Chapter meets at its agreed upon interval of every 2 - 4 weeks to ensure active status

Section 6: The Chapter's internal functions shall be segmented and organized into 6 committees and their potential associated Working Groups:

Khavershaft

- Community building, local events, solidarity

Education

- Content creation, program assistance, history, reading groups, Ladino, Yiddish

Workers

- Building worker power, relationship building, May Day events, union partnerships

Membership & Onboard

- Recruitment, Airtable Management, Chapter development

Communications

- Internal and External comms, social media, emails

Administration

- Records mgt, finance, election mgt, internal governance

Section 7: Committee Members may deputize any active member to assist them in fulfilling their responsibilities.

Section 8: Committee Members should create, update, and maintain guidelines on the scope of their responsibilities that are readily accessible to the membership.

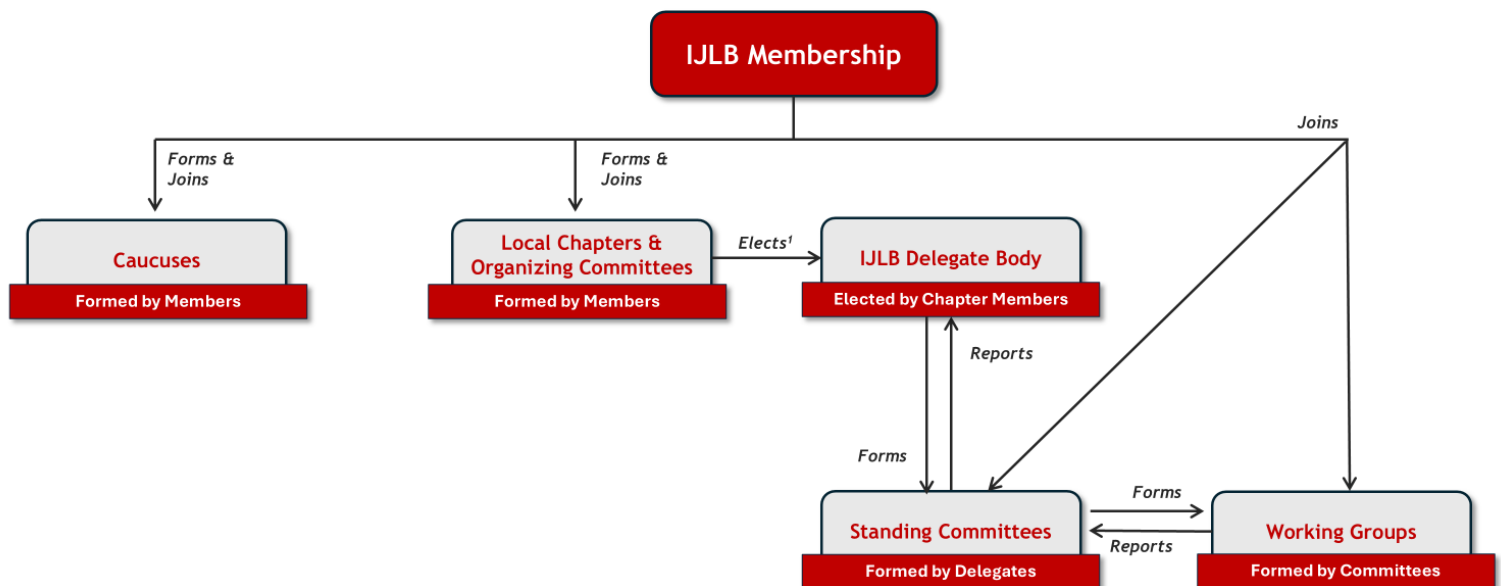

- Future pages in this document also further outline the purpose of each sub-groups

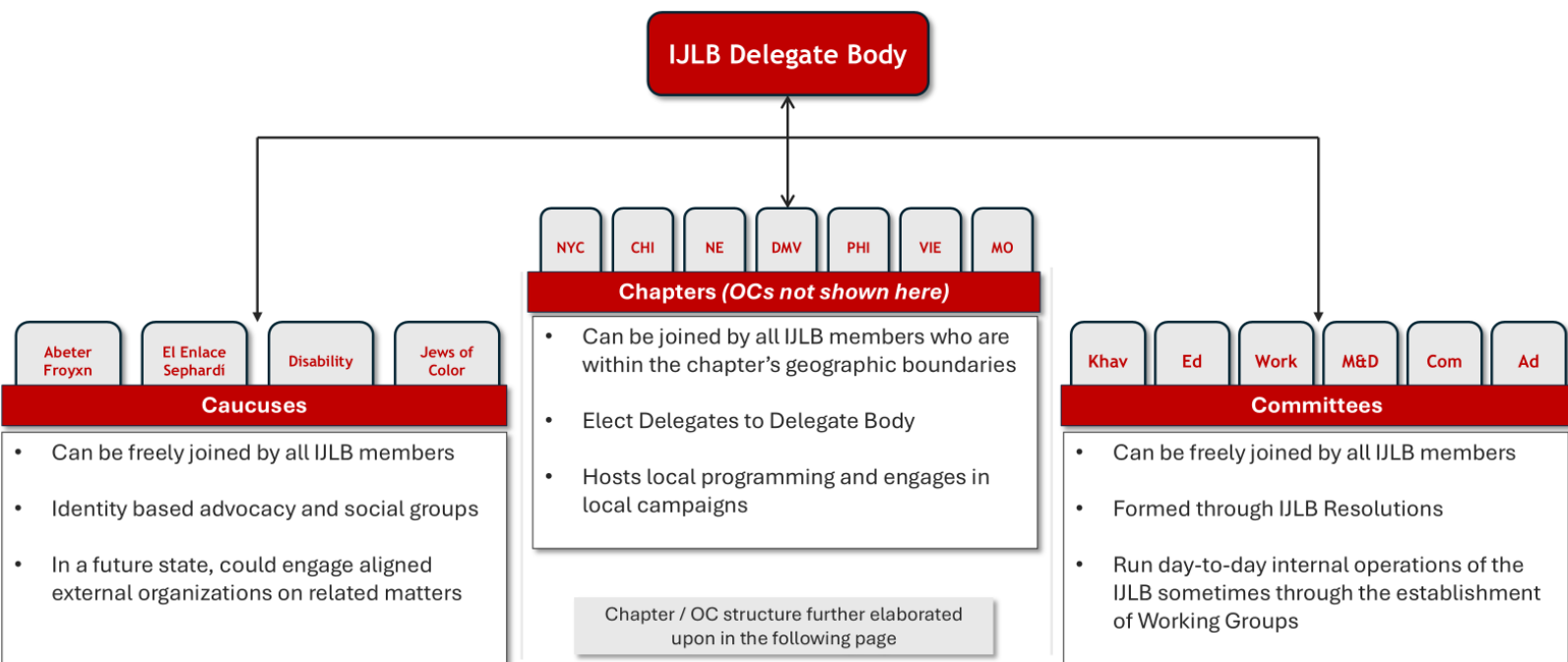


1. Only Chapters and not Organizing Committees can vote with and elect delegates

Current Bund Status:

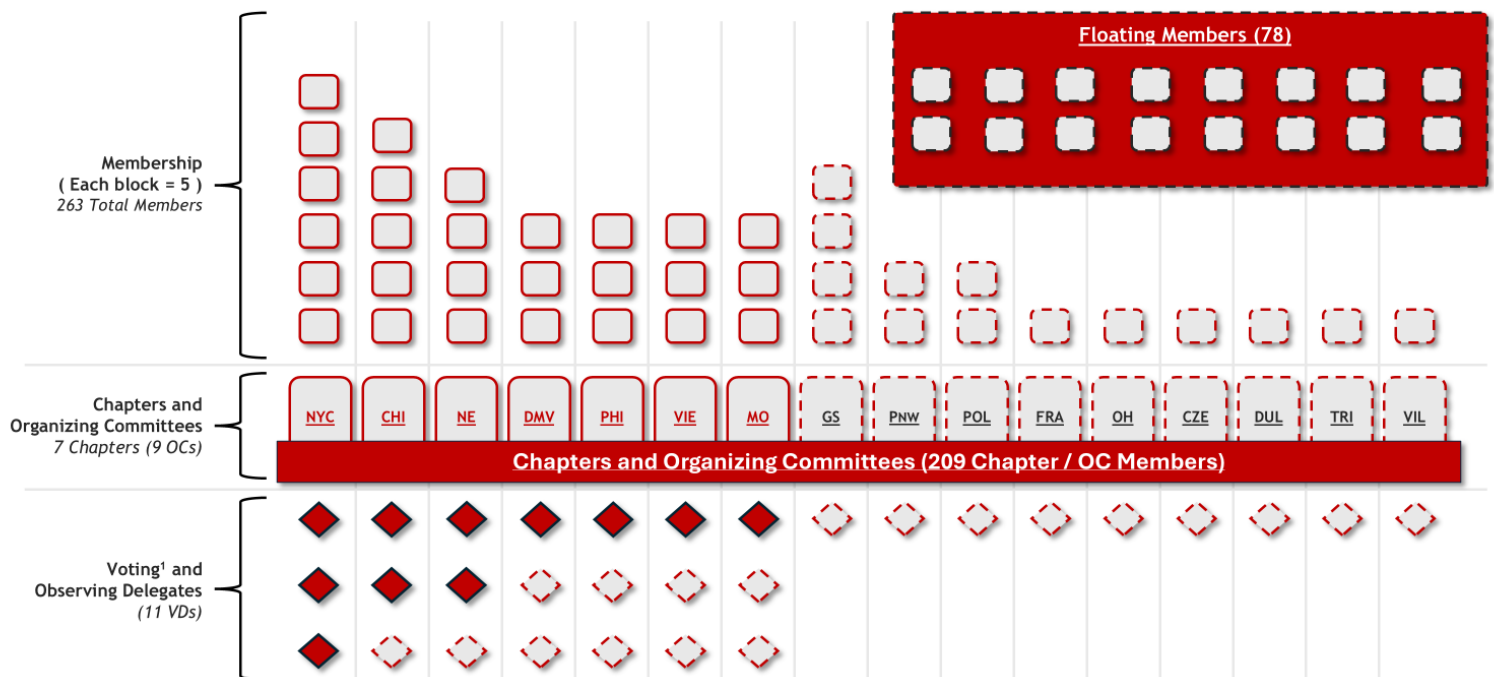
- **Caucuses:** Abeter Froxyn, El Enlace Sephardí, Disability, and Jews of Color
- **Chapters:** NYC, NE, DMV, PA, CHI, VIE, and MO
- **Committees:** Khavershaft, Education, Workers, Membership & Onboard, Communications, and Administration





Chapter Membership & Delegates:

- If possible, members are sorted into a local chapter
- Chapters are awarded delegates for international decisions based on membership count (10 = 1, 20 = 2, and 30 = 3 delegates)
- Future resolution will outline process by which to allow “floating members” representation in the delegate body

1. Red diamonds refer to Voting Delegates vs Observing Delegates

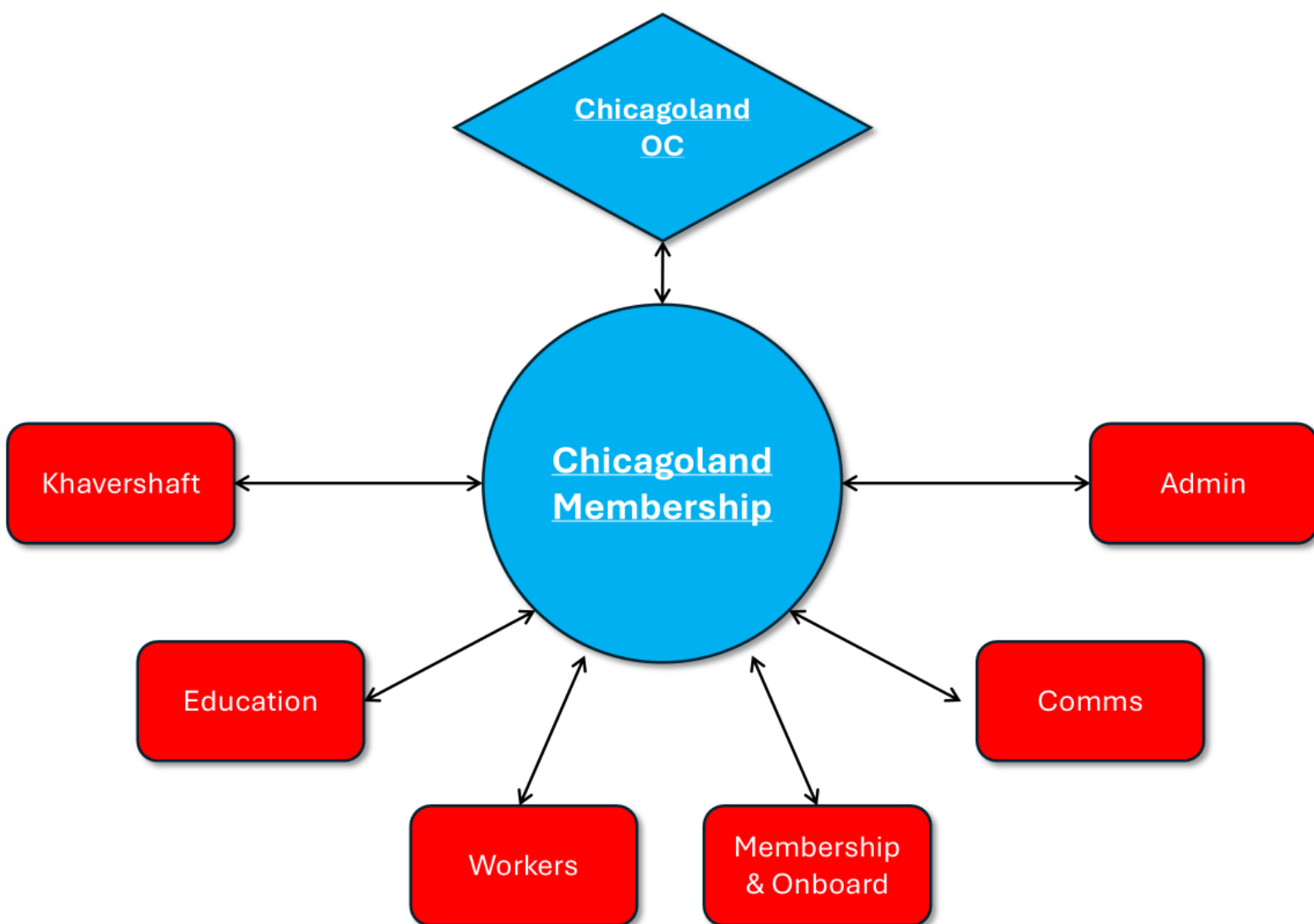
Local Chicagoland Specific Structure outlined on next page



Chicagoland Local Structure:

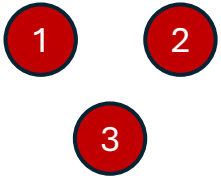
Chicagoland Members can elect, join, and form the following:

- *Organizing Committee:* Consists of the Chapter's international (IJLB) Delegates and local event Conveners
- *Standing Committees:* Serve to progress the chapters chosen functions internally and within the Chicago community; current committees established are shown in the red boxes below



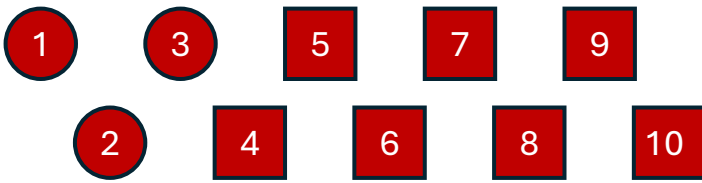


3-10-3 Explainer



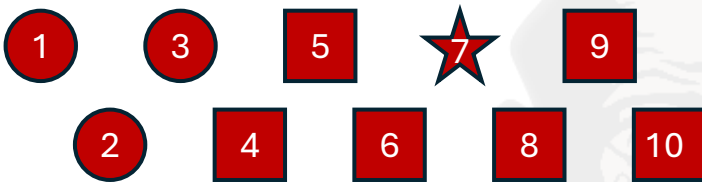
3:

The initial Organizing Committee (OC) of 3 people at a minimum is tasked with recruiting enough people to form a new Bund chapter for a particular geographic area. They should meet regularly and can also hold events to aid this early state of organizing



10:

The Organizing Committee of 3 is dissolved once it's gotten 7 additional people (10 total) to officially form a chapter and has convened the first official chapter meeting to redistribute organizing responsibilities



3:

3 new local roles are elected at the first meeting of the new chapter. At least 1 "delegate" (star) is also chosen from any of the members (whether on a committee or not) to represent the chapter at the International level

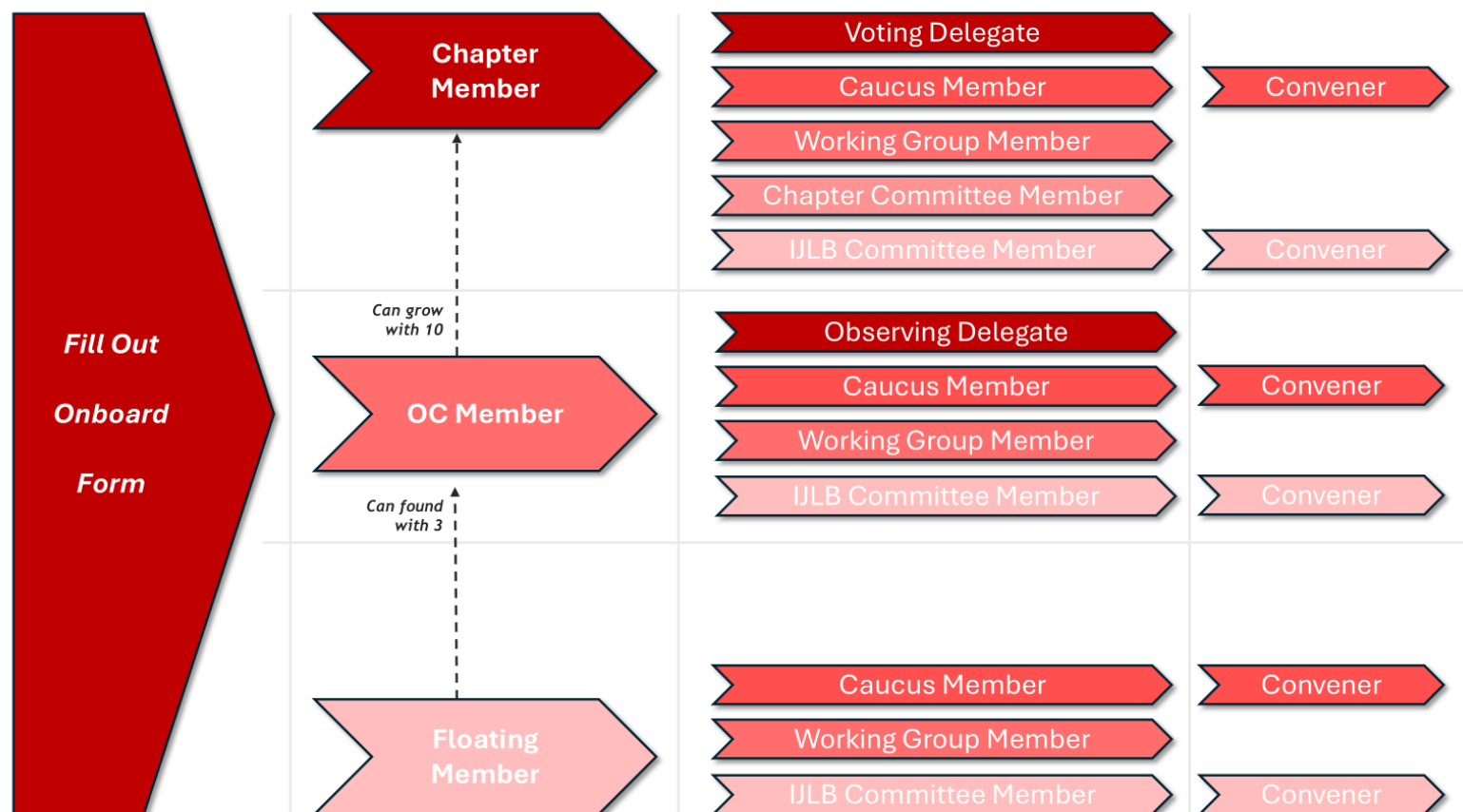


Some chapters will likely start off covering larger geographic areas, but once more people are involved, more localized organizing committees and chapters can be established



IJLB Member Pathways:

- Membership can be granted after the initial onboard form containing the Principles of Unity and Code of Conduct has been signed, and an onboard call / chapter specific vetting process has been conducted
- Members pathways can vary based on local organization's current international standing, however members can help progress their local into a full chapter and hence access all possible pathways

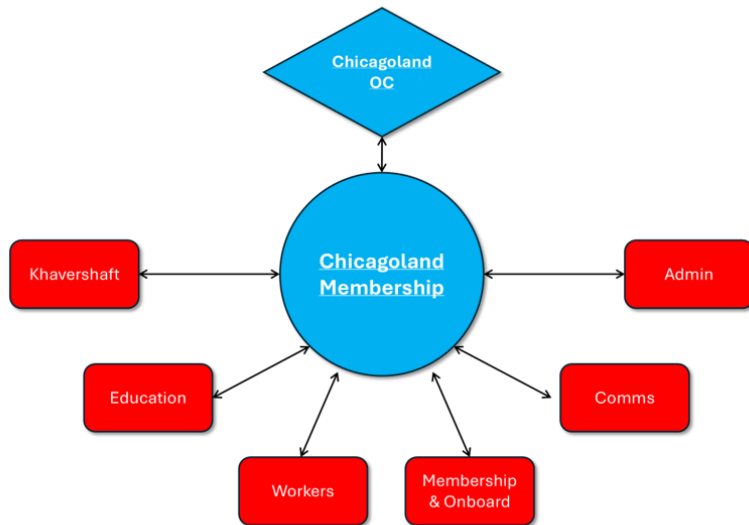

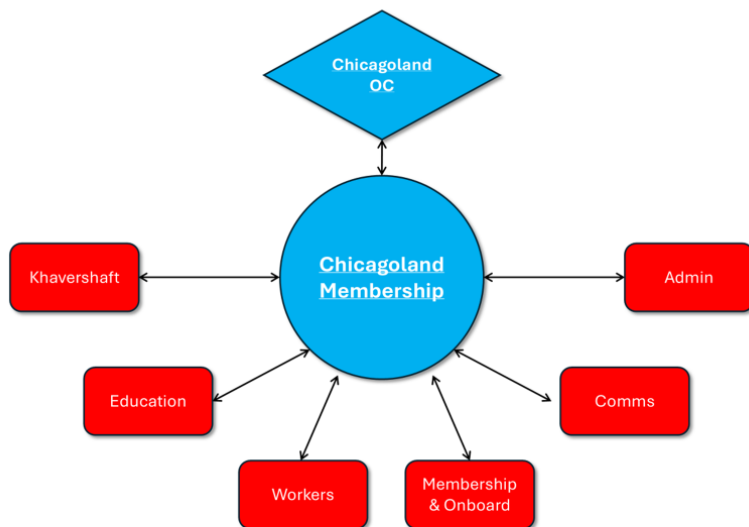


Chicagoland Local Member Pathways



Current Committee Descriptions

- **Khavershaft Committee**
 - Community building, local events, solidarity
- **Education Committee**
 - Content creation, program assistance, history, reading groups, Ladino, Yiddish
- **Workers Committee**
 - Building worker power, relationship building, May Day events, union relationship management
- **Membership & Onboard Committee**
 - Recruitment, Airtable management, development
- **Communications Committee**
 - Internal communications, external communications, social media, email correspondence
- **Admin Committee**
 - Records management, finances, election management, internal governance, system creation



Current Organizing Committee (OC) Status

- **Process**
(Next Election to be held on Aug 12th, 2026)
 - While Membership is free to join any Committee at any time, Members must run for positions within the Chapter OC
 - Current Organizing Committee Members were elected to 3-month terms at the Chapter Founding Meeting
- **Delegates**
(Current Delegates have been elected by Membership until 8/12/2026)
 - Represent the Chapter at IJLB Delegate Body Meetings
- **Conveners**
(Current Conveners have been elected by Membership until 8/12/2026)
 - Ensure the Chapter is meeting locally on regular basis



Vision for the Bund

Building on the 3 pillars of Hereness, Jewishness, and Solidarity we want to paint a picture of a movement that is **radically Jewish, deeply grounded, and oriented toward justice in every direction.**

1. Living Jewish Culture for All

Jewish culture is not owned by institutions, it lives in the people

We celebrate and expand access to the full spectrum of grassroots Jewish culture in all its historical and contemporary forms. Art, music, literature, languages, foodways, fashion, film, memory, and treasure are not just preserved, but actively lived and shared in diverse and inclusive ways. We create and support local and diasporic cultural spaces that are accessible, participatory, and joyful. We honor Yiddishkayt as a living legacy among many, and uplift all Jewish cultural expressions.

2. Grounded in Community, Rooted in Care

We are embedded in Jewish communities, not as an online phenomenon, but as a living, material force

The Bund is embedded in local Jewish communal life, creating spaces of mutual aid, cultural exchange, and solidarity that respond to real needs. We refuse the marginalization of Jewish working people by reclaiming space, presence, and agency in the places where we live, gather, and struggle. Through shared meals, cultural gatherings, and mutual aid networks, we turn political values into lived relationships; we connect the personal and the collective, the everyday and the transformative. We meet people where they are, build bridges, and reject elitism. We organize *as Jews* - not despite it, not apologetically, and not only online.

3. Jews in the Struggle

We are not allies, we are stakeholders

In labor, housing, feminist, environmental, and urban justice movements, the Bund shows up as a Jewish force - not from the outside, but from within. Jewish liberation is bound up with the liberation of all people, and we bring our history of struggle and resistance to today's coalitions. We view Jewish voices as integral to movement work, not exceptional to it.

4. Liberation for All Peoples

We stand against occupation, apartheid, and nationalism

We believe in a just peace for Palestinians and Israelis. The Bund works toward a vision of shared liberation that goes beyond critique. We hold space for diaspora Jews to speak and act with clarity, courage, and care, knowing that there are many visions of what liberation might look like, and many fears and wounds that shape how we relate to that work. We strive to be a place where the full range of liberatory ideas can be explored in good faith, grounded in solidarity, historical understanding, and a shared commitment to justice for all peoples.
